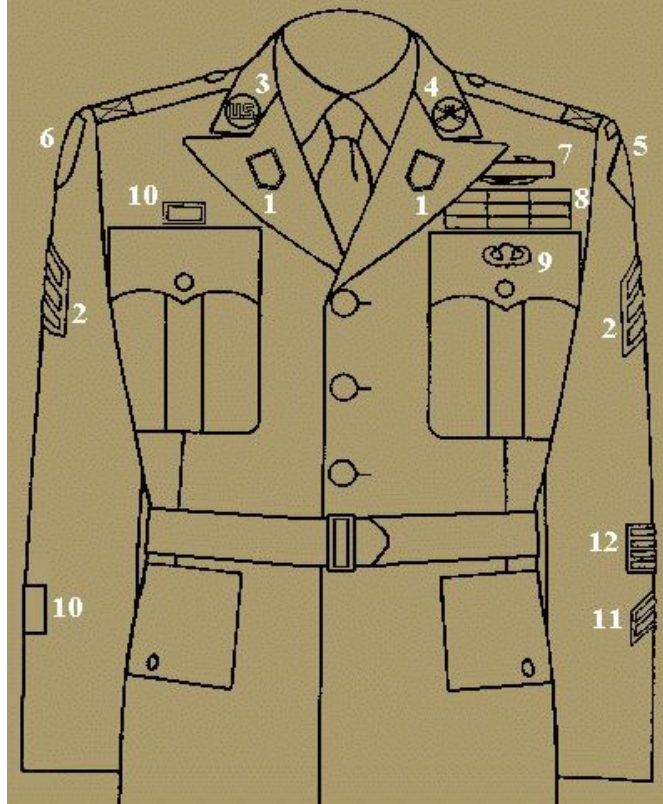


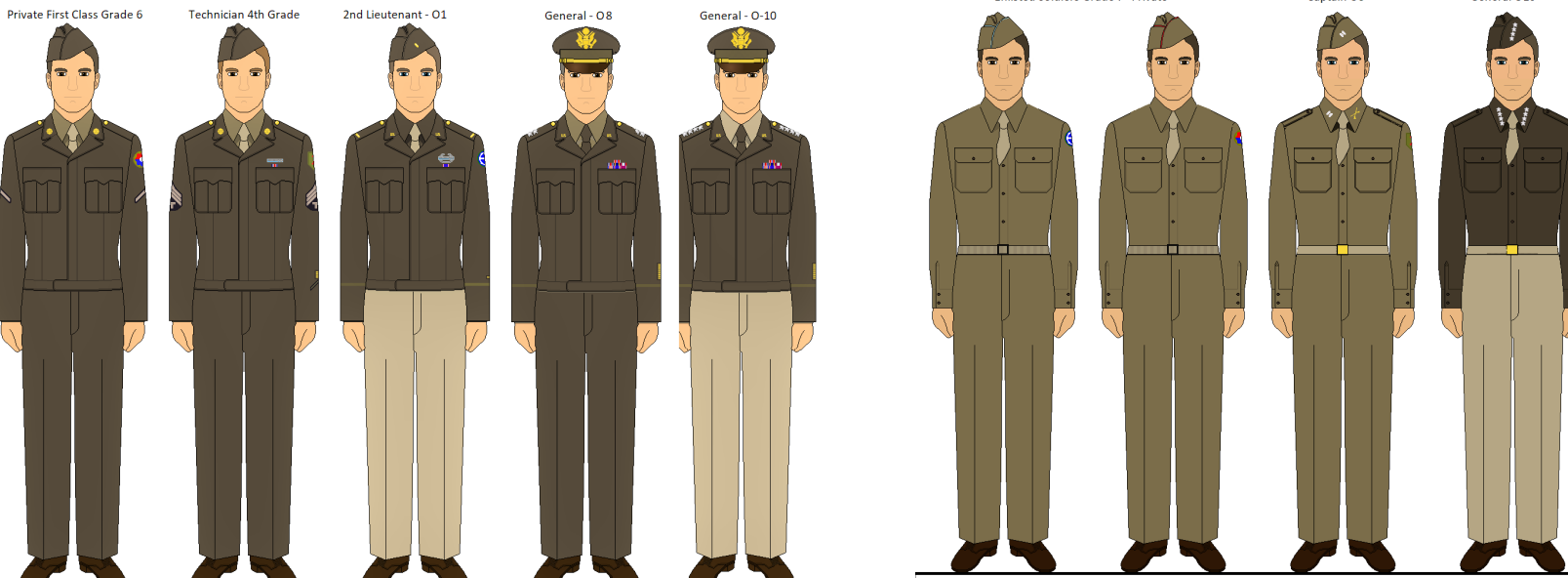
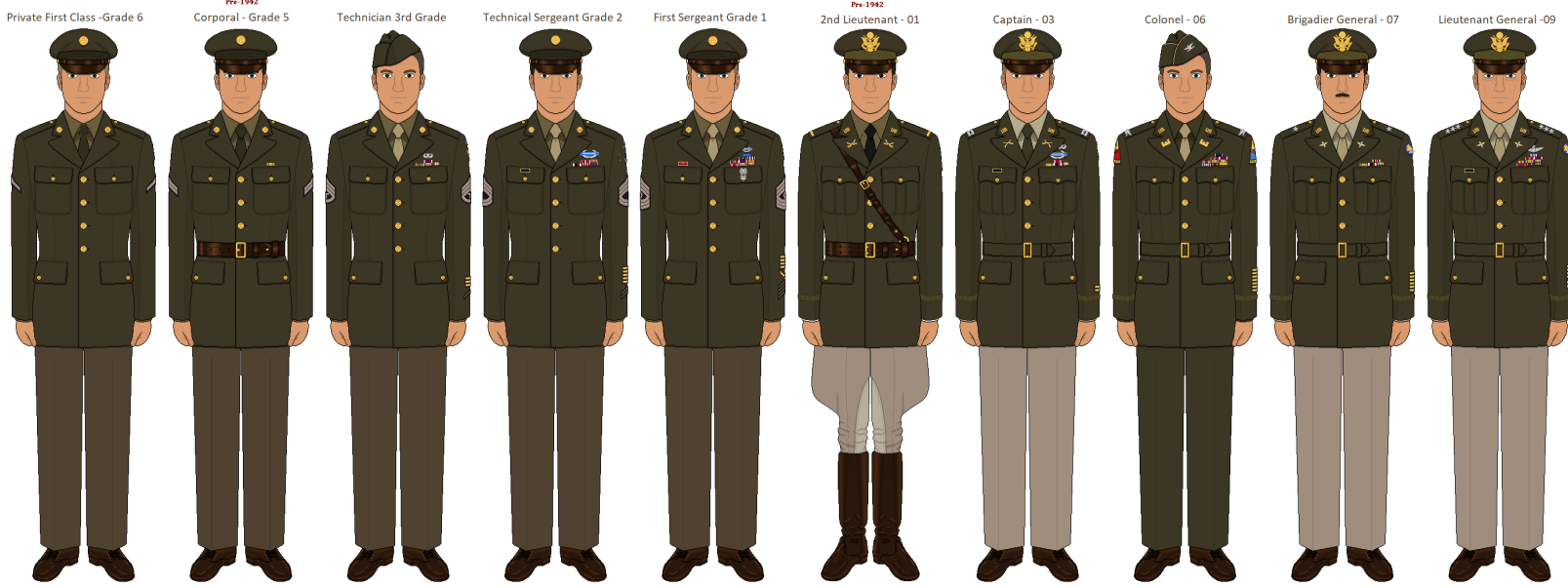


Dress Uniform insignia placement



1. DUI's, lower Level.
2. Enlisted Rank, Halfway between elbow and top of shoulder.
3. US Disk, Right upper Level.
4. Infantry or Occupational Specialty Disk, Upper left Level.
5. Division Patch /shoulder sleeve insignia.
6. Overseas unit patch / for veterans that served in combat overseas.
7. CIB/EIB – For Veterans that earned it.
8. Service Ribbons, Authorized by the Unit Commander.
9. Service Qualification Badges. (Airborne, Marksmanship, Vehicle Driver, Etc....)
10. Meritorious Service Award.
11. Service Stripes (Time in the 26YDHRG)
12. Overseas Bars (1 for every 7 ETO Type events)

NOTE: Ike Jacket or Waist Coat became prevalent late and post war. Initial designs were from US Army Air Forces in 1943 as cut down tunics or service coats as to comply with British forces in England. Technician Grades such as Tech 5 were referred to as Corporal. Technician Grade 4 & 3 were referred to as Sergeant.

Class B Uniform, Mustard Wool Uniform & Officer Chocolate/Pinks. All Enlisted from Private to Master Sergeant were required wear the Mustard wool Uniform (Or Khaki's given Tropical Conditions) Officer's had more to choose from. Commonly Infantry Officers most often wore Mustard wools as Air Force Officer would prefer Chocolates and Pinks. Usually a base commander or commander would determine what uniform the officers would be required to wear when serving in that unit. Mustard wool became somewhat darker late in the war. Enlisted trouser belts were an OD3 color as Officers were Khaki and required a Brass Buckle when not in the field. Foot wear was Brown either low quaters or service shoes.
